A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

New Year Greetings!

ell, at least happy new liturgical year. Starting on Sunday December 3rd the liturgical season of Advent begins. There are four Sundays in Advent. This year since Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday, we will celebrate three of those four Sundays. The season of Advent is intended to be a time of spiritual preparation for Christmas. But how do we do that? What sort of preparation do we need to do spiritually to prepare ourselves?

This has been a question of interest for the church throughout its history and the tone of Advent has seen many changes throughout those years. For some periods of time Advent was seen as a joyous time of preparation, focused on preparing for the celebration and feast of Christmas, while during other periods Lent was treated as a mini-Lent, a season dedicated to preparation through self-reflection on our own brokenness and our need for the Saviour Jesus Christ. So, what about now?

I like to think of Advent as a mix of both traditions. In fact, I think both approaches work well together. Advent starts with some self-reflection which I believe almost always leads to a realization of our complete dependence on God's grace shown through the birth, life, crucifixion, and resurrection of Jesus. And, then we are able to more fully celebrate the astonishing gift that all of creation received on that Christmas night more than 2,000 years ago. Through realizing the brokenness of our own natures and spirits we are better able to feel deep down the amazing gift that was, is, and continues to be God's grace delivered through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

So, in this holiday season let us rejoice in our God which treats us with such amazing compassion, grace, and love, and let us challenge ourselves to be symbols of that same compassion, grace, and love.

hese are two organizations that St. Philip's has supported for years. We now have another avenue to support them and that is through Thrivent. If you are a member of Thrivent, you collect what is known as Choice Dollars. Choice Dollars are accumulated throughout the year and can be donated to different organizations. I-Help and the Food Bank for Monterey County have been added to the list of organizations as of this fall. They are there in addition to St. Philip's and the ELCA organizations. To access your Choice Dollars, go to the Thrivent web site http://thrivent.com. I-Help is listed as Outreach Unlimited aka IHelp and the food bank as Food Bank for Monterey County. Monies that may be in your Choice Dollar account need to be used by March 31, 2024.

Treasurer's Report

s shown below, St. Philip's expenses exceed our income, consistent with the budget approved at a special congregational meeting in early April, 2023. If giving holds steady, and congregational members who will be away at Christmas would consider making any Christmas or year-end contributions prior to the end of the year, we will be on track to meet the targets approved by the congregation.

Jan 1 to Nov 18, 2023:

Offering: \$128,634
Other revenue: \$2746
Expenses: \$153,276
Deficit: \$21,896

NOTE: A deficit if \$27,269 was approved by congregational vote when the budget was approved.

Significant unplanned expenses involve building and grounds maintenance, higher than anticipated costs for lodging at the synod assembly, and ongoing expenses related to the sound and streaming system

Other Financial information and plans:

A draft 2024 budget will be available to the congregation before the holiday. Unfortunately, the council anticipates some major facilities expenditures related to roof repair and exterior painting. This maintenance is needed to maintain the value of the building, and in an effort to avoid even larger costs in the future if essential maintenance is not completed in coming months.

We anticipate needing to tap into the Apple Stock to cover the cost of roof repair and any structural damage that is identified, and will bring forward a plan to the congregation as soon as we have more information.

WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES THIS CHRISTMAS SEASON 2023

he Worship Committee met November 13th to begin preparing for the upcoming celebration of Christ's birth at Christmas. The new church year begins December 3rd, the first Sunday in Advent, which means preparing our hearts for the coming of Christ. During our worship service, another candle on the Advent Wreath will be lit, until Christmas Eve, when the center white Christ candle will also be lit.

BULLETIN CHANGES:

Ithough we will continue using the same liturgy, there will be bulletin changes to reflect Advent thoughts during this month. A special bulletin will be used for Christmas Eve, with carols, including the traditional candlelight singing of Silent Night. Sunday, December 31st, will be a Hymn Sing Sunday, a time of worship through carols and Scripture. Beginning in January, the bulletin will use the familiar Haugen liturgy until Lent.
