### What does it mean when the ELCA says that we are a Sanctuary Denomination?

Greetings,

On August 5th almost 1,000 ELCA Lutherans gathered in Milwaukee for the triennial ELCA Churchwide Assembly. At this Assembly these 900+ Lutherans conducted the business of the church as the legislative body of this denomination. This business ranged from re-electing Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton to approving a three year budget for the Churchwide expression. However the action that has received the most news coverage was a vote to become a Sanctuary Denomination. This was a historical vote in that the ELCA is the first Christian Denomination in the country to make such a declaration.

This decision by the assembly has raised many questions among ELCA Lutherans across the country. What does it mean to be a sanctuary denomination? Will this require congregations to host immigrants, or break the law? All of these questions are good and we are able to answer most of them, but not all of them, some of them will require learning in the moment. Below are some answers to the most frequently asked questions. If you have other questions I encourage you to come to our Adult Forum on Sunday Sept. 1st and/or be in contact with Pastor Tony.

- In its simplest form, becoming a sanctuary denomination means that the ELCA is publicly declaring that walking alongside immigrants and refugees is a matter of faith. The ELCA Churchwide Assembly, the highest legislative authority of the ELCA, declared that when we preach on Sunday that Jesus told us to welcome, we will use our hands and voices on Monday to make sure it happens.
- Being a sanctuary denomination does not call for any person, congregation or synod to engage in any illegal actions.
- We have a broken system regarding immigration, refugees and asylum-seekers. To declare ourselves a sanctuary church body is to say that we seek to provide concrete resources to assist the most vulnerable who are feeling the sharp edges of this broken system.
- Being a sanctuary denomination is about loving our neighbors. While we may have different ideas about how to fix this broken system and may have different ways of loving our neighbors, our call to love our neighbor is central to our faith.




### **News from the Library**

Have you made a trip down the hall to the St. Philip's Library? No? What will you find there? The shelves are filled with books that explore theology, there are helps for your Bible study, self-help books, novels, St. Philip's publications, jigsaw puzzles, and music CDs. New to the library - *The Second Mountain* by David Brooks, *Sabbath* by Wayne Muller, *From Pain to Joy* by Nancy Hanson, and a study guide *Through the Wilderness of Alzheimer's* by Robert and Anne Simpson. Come on down and visit the library!



In *The Second Mountain,* David Brooks explores the four commitments that define a life of meaning and purpose: to a spouse and family, to a vocation, to a philosophy or faith, and to a community. Our personal fulfillment depends on how well we choose and execute these commitments. Brooks looks at a range of people who have lived joyous, committed lives, and who have embraced the necessity and beauty of dependence. He gathers their wisdom on how to choose a partner, how to pick a vocation, how to live out a philosophy, and how we can begin to integrate our commitments into one overriding purpose.

In short, this book is meant to help us all lead more meaningful lives. But it's also a provocative social commentary. We live in a society, Brooks argues, that celebrates freedom, that tells us to be true to ourselves, at the expense of surrendering to a cause, rooting ourselves in a neighborhood, binding ourselves to others by social solidarity and love. We have taken individualism to the extreme—and in the process we have torn the social fabric in a thousand different ways. The path to repair is through making deeper commitments. In *The Second Mountain*, Brooks shows what can happen when we put commitment-making at the center of our lives.



Millennia ago, the tradition of Sabbath created an oasis of sacred time within a life of unceasing labor. Now, in a book that can heal our harried lives Wayne Muller, ordained minister, therapist and founder of Bread for the Journey, shows us how to create a special time of rest, delight, and renewal - a refuse for your souls. We need not even schedule an entire day each week. Sabbath time can be a Sabbath afternoon, a Sabbath hour, a Sabbath walk. This book was the recent St. Philip's Book Club selection.
