The one who betrayed Jesus was fed and loved by Jesus.

In the midst of the clutter that is social media I found the reminder I needed. The reminder that God isn't looking for perfection. God isn't expecting a huge party. God doesn't even expect or require faithfulness to be a recipient of love. God simply loves! That's it. God loves Judas, God loves you, and God loves me. So when times seem gloomy and cloudy let us hold onto that little bit of good news. God loves no questions asked.



I-HELP UPDATE

NEWS FROM THE I-HELP FORUM ON 3/14:

- There are 19-23 men and 6-7 women a night using the services of I-Help.
- Some of the men have been working with a program Wellspring Church that is teaching them landscaping skills and some have found jobs as a result of that program.
- The total sum of money raised from Monterey County Gives was \$74,129! The donations were matched at 14.7% to reach the total. The monthly expenses for the programs run about \$25,000. The board continues to seek grants from local agencies and cities.
- They are hoping to replace some of the buses with decommissioned vans from Monterey Salinas Transit. Having vans will allow for drivers without commercial license.
- St. Philip's continues to serve a meal and host the men on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. If you would like to assist, contact Carolyn Berry or Mary Kramer.
